According to research, family involvement has a positive effect on student behavior.

- When families are involved, students exhibit more positive attitudes and behavior.
- When students report feeling support from both home and school, they have more self-confidence, feel school is more important, and they tend to do better in school.
- Student at-risk behaviors decrease as parent involvement increases.

Hobart High School is very committed to providing students with a positive learning environment; therefore, we have developed the BRICK program to meet that commitment. Students are encouraged to earn a **BRICK** in five target areas and will be rewarded each quarter for meeting those five. Detailed information is below.

BRICK

At Hobart High School, the five target **BRICK** areas include the following:

- B**- Be Here
- R**- Respect
- I**- Involvement
- C**- Citizenship
- K**- Knowledge

B = Be Here:

Attendance will be measured each quarter by achieving outstanding attendance in all classes. Positive attendance is defined as having no more than 2 excused absences, no truancies, no unexcused absences, and no tardies in all classes combined. It is important for students to be present each and every school day in order to gain valuable learning experiences.

R = Respect:

Respect will be measured each quarter by earning no referrals and by teacher recommendation. Students can show respect to themselves, others, and property by making good choices.

I = Involvement:

Involvement will be measured each quarter by participation in clubs, ROTC, fine arts, or on athletic teams. Being a part of a group allows students to foster relationships with peers, gain knowledge, and work toward individual goals. We believe that students involved in the school culture will be successful in the classroom.

C = Citizenship:

Citizenship will be measured each quarter by volunteering two community service hours each quarter. Community service stretches a student to reach beyond him or herself while voluntarily helping others or an organization without being paid.

K = Knowledge:

Knowledge will be measured each quarter by meeting the requirements of the honor roll: earning a 3.0 Grade Point Average and not earning any 'F'. However, students who do not meet the 3.0 grade point average can earn a BRICK in this area if they have not earned an 'F' and have no missing assignments in their classes. Teachers will recommend these students for a BRICK each quarter.
