Joev Sparks, a "rookie" football player on the Hobart Brickies football team, was living a dream when the nightmare hit. He had played in all of two games, one of which was against the Gary West Side Cougars, when he was diagnosed

with non-Hodgkin's lymphoma.

Surgery, chemo and hospital time took the place of being on the football field, but his team rallied around him with visits, calls and even a fundraiser to assist his parents with expenses. Even more touching, when the West Side players learned about Joey's diagnosis, they added their support with calls, cards and prayers.

Joey was told in February he was cancer-free, and his mom believes that all the support he was showered with helped him heal.

An aunt, Valerie Heuring, a third-generation owner of Paul Heuring Ford in Hobart, enrolled in a Ford Motor Co. fundraising program, Drive One 4 UR School, and Joey's story was selected as a winner, meaning he could choose where the \$6,000 prize went.

The Hobart Football Booster Club was Joev's choice, to say "thank you." But he wasn't done vet. In Ford's "Go Further" program, Joey's situation was again a winner, and this time he chose

the West Side team to receive the \$1,000 prize.

Better yet, Ford was so impressed with the outpouring of caring from all these young men and Joev's reciprocal ways that the snowball kept rolling, and the West Side players will be the recipients of new helmets and shoulder pads.

All of you Hobart Brickies and West Side Cougars and Joey Sparks are my pet persons of the week. Thank you for leading the way.

Of course you've heard it before, but here's a reminder again. Hundreds of little children with their parents, and even some bigger kids allowed on their own, will be zooming helter-skelter from house to house to fill their bags full of treats Friday.

The excitement of the evening is the best part, but the kids will be more intent on tracking what's in the bag than they are about cars driving to and fro. So, please, drive extra carefully. Then I hope you have a great day because you deserve it.
