He was not content to even begin rehearsal until every instrument was in perfect pitch and the entire group had enjoyed "warming up" exercises.

The fine results were immediately apparent when Dr. Howard Hanson took over the baton to direct the group in the first movement of his "Romantic" Symphony. Dr. Hanson had every right to be pleased with the ready, capable and thoroughly musician-like manner in which the band tackled this advanced, difficult music.


